Cottage Homes is entering an exciting period of growth which will increase the number of people we can house by up to a huge 26% over the next few years and see us expand out of metropolitan Adelaide for the first time.

We are thrilled to have signed an agreement to lease land from Club Fleurieu to create a Cottage Homes site at Yankalilla – the first arrangement of its kind in our long history.



Our longest resident Elizabeth Garrett (pictured) has called Cottage Homes Mitcham home since 1997, moving into units with her sister Eva and friend Sandor after a recommendation from a family friend. "Doesn't seem so long ago..." she reminisces.

A dedicated volunteer, Elizabeth was involved with the Hungarian Club at Norwood for 15 years. She fondly remembers the early days at Mitcham, when an onsite caretaker collected rent, managed maintenance, and checked on residents.

Now, she enjoys the recent renovations. "It's brilliant! Using the ramp with my walker is a breeze!" she says. Elizabeth makes the most of her days, going on local outings with another resident, shopping via the Council bus, and staying connected with family on her iPad.

A true sports fanatic, she follows gridiron, basketball, baseball, and the Crows in the AFL. "I enjoy living here. It's in an ideal position – Mitcham is a lovely suburb."

Up to 15 units will be built nearby existing club rooms and Men's Shed on the spacious Club Fleurieu grounds that feature a rose garden and rotunda, a fruit orchard and shared garden.

We are working closely with John Byleveld Studios and URPS on the site layout and unit design, with the aim to complete planning approvals and appoint a builder in 2025 and commence building by early 2026.

In another first for Cottage Homes, the new units will be built using modular housing which is built offsite and transported into place, reducing waste and time.

Planning is also underway for an expansion at Ascot Park, the site of our last sizable growth (10 units in 2014). In 2024, we purchased a house adjacent to the existing site which will be redeveloped into four brand new units.

In another exciting advancement, we are working with Brown Falconer Architects on a concept plan to add housing for an additional 15 people at Glenelg, including extra carparking and enhanced landscaping and communal areas for both new and existing residents.

These significant things in the life of our organisation will help to provide even more safe, secure, and affordable rental housing for older South Australians.

We have entered a significant and exciting period of growth for Cottage Homes, potentially **increasing the number of people we can help by up to 26%**.

## A TAPESTRY OF WORK

Professional achievements are part of the milestones that make life truly memorable. Some of our residents have enjoyed exciting and fulfilling professional careers which spanned different fields and countries.

Ascot Park resident Tony Chicarella enjoyed a 50year career as a chef before he retired aged 75. Tony completed his early training in Italy before honing his skills in restaurants in France, Belgium, Switzerland and England.

After coming to Australia in the mid-1960s, Tony worked at the Freeway Hotel at Pooraka then described as 'luxurious' and 'the largest and most outstandingly designed suburban hotel in Australia' when it opened in 1966. "It was a new place, the best place, it was wonderful!" said Tony. Glenelg resident Philip Pike is an artist born in Maitland South Australia. After studying at Flinders University, Philip worked in radio and television before moving interstate to work with Queensland Performing Arts Trust.

Always following his artistic side, Philip also pursued music, fine arts and writing, with two published books in his name and his work exhibited in several South Australian galleries.

One career highlight for Philip was when the director of music at St Stephen's Cathedral used his paintings as inspiration to compose a symphony. This was performed in the cathedral while the paintings were exhibited in the adjoining chapel.

## DECADES OF SERVICE & DEDICATION

There are some amazing stories of service throughout Cottage Homes' history.

One of the most notable is the Marryat family, whose 74-year service was vital to the establishment and early growth of Cottage Homes.

Charles Marryat married Grace Montgomery in 1854 and together they had 6 daughters and 3 sons. Charles coordinated and chaired the first ever committee meeting in 1871 which led to the establishment of Cottage Homes in 1872.

Charles served on the Committee for 35 years and his son Charles was an honorary architect.

The Marryat women were also strongly connected to Cottage Homes. Grace served on the Committee for 38 years and their three daughters, Isabel, Katie and Mabel also served on the Committee. Mabel resigned from the Cottage Homes Committee 80 years ago in 1945, closing her family's incredible chapter of service and dedication to our organisation.

After moving to Brisbane with her then husband, Philip, Anna was an examiner with Queensland's Australian Music Examinations Board. "This gave me the opportunity to travel throughout Queensland which was a wonderful experience," said Anna.
